**Re: Right-to-Know Request Regarding Prison Mail Restrictions in Amendment to PPD
5.26 Effective May 1, 2015**

Dear Commissioner Wrenn:

This is a Right-to-Know request to the New Hampshire Department of Corrections pursuant to RSA 91-A by the American Civil Liberties Union of New Hampshire ("ACLU"). The ACLU defends and promotes the fundamental principles embodied in the Bill of Rights and the U.S. and New Hampshire Constitutions. In furtherance of that mission, the ACLU regularly conducts research into government activities in New Hampshire.

This request seeks records concerning, among other things, the new prison mail restrictions reflected in the amendment to PPD 5.26 effective May 1, 2015. As the ACLU is a public-interest organization, we ask that the Department waive all fees associated with responding to this request. Please contact me to discuss the fee waiver in advance of preparing any copies. Below, I have enumerated certain categories of information for production in accordance with RSA 91-A:

1. All documents and communications concerning the new prison mail restrictions reflected in the amendment to PPD 5.26 effective May 1, 2015, including any documents and communications reflecting the purported need for these new restrictions. Please include in your response documents concerning any research conducted into whether any other State prisons have similar restrictions.
2. All documents and communications reflecting incidents from January 1, 2010 to the present where inmates have smuggled drugs (e.g., Suboxone, etc.) into any State prison facility using mailed greeting cards. Please include documents concerning the entire adjudicatory process of any such incidents, including how the drugs were discovered by prison authorities.

3. All documents and communications reflecting incidents from January 1, 2010 to the present where inmates have smuggled drugs (e.g., Suboxone, etc.) into any State prison facility by affixing the drugs to mailed postcards containing a graphic design, picture, or drawing. Please include documents concerning the entire adjudicatory process of any such incidents, including how the drugs were discovered by prison authorities.


4. All documents and communications reflecting incidents from January 1, 2010 to the present where inmates have smuggled drugs (e.g., Suboxone, etc.) into any State prison facility by affixing the drugs to mailed drawings, stickers, or other depictions, including pencil and ink drawings. Please include documents concerning the entire adjudicatory process of any such incidents, including how the drugs were discovered by prison authorities.

In responding to this request, please consider the time limits mandated by the Right-to-Know law. In discussing those limits in *ATV Watch v. N.H. Dep't of Res. & Econ. Dev.*, 155 N.H. 434 (2007), the New Hampshire Supreme Court has stated that RSA 91-A:4, IV requires that a public body or agency, "within 5 business days of the request, make such records available, deny the request in writing with reasons, or to furnish written acknowledgement of the receipt of the request and a statement of the time reasonably necessary to determine whether the request shall be granted or denied." *Id.* at 440. That said, we will be reasonable with respect to the timing of the Department's response.

If produced, these records must be produced irrespective of their storage format; that is, they must be produced whether they are kept in tangible (hard copy) form or in an electronically-stored format, including but not limited to e-mail communications. If any records are withheld, or any portion redacted, please specify the reasons.

Thank you for your anticipated cooperation. I look forward to hearing from you as soon as possible. Of course, if you have any questions or concerns, do not hesitate to contact me.

Dear Attorney Bissonnette,

We searched our records and found responsive documents and reports to your May 8, 2015 right to know request. However there may be more documents that we have not yet discovered and may need additional time to research and review. Let me address your points and what we have found.

Point 1.

- March 27, 2015 memorandum from the Commissioner announcing the new policy addendum
- March 10, 2015 DOC Executive staff meeting minutes in which this topic was discussed
- January 5, 2015 monthly warden's meeting agenda on which the topic is listed. No minutes are kept.
- April 30, 2015 email to Public Information Officers at other State Departments of Corrections about their mail policies. There were six responses.
- We have not determined what if any e-mail correspondences on this policy change exist.

Points 2, 3 and 4.


- Northern NH Correctional Facility tracking log of mail room incidents involving the introduction of Suboxone since 2012. This document reports 55 incidents during that time frame and summarizes the method of conveyance. We would redact identifiers or confidential investigative information.
- The other Department facilities do not keep a tracking log and to obtain the information that you requested will require an extensive review of individual incident and investigative reports over the last five years. This process will take many months to complete and we need additional time to find the original reports as well as review them for records that are exempted per RSA 91-A:5.
- However, we can provide you with a cumulative log of violations to prison disciplinary rule 27-A in Policy, Procedure, and Directive 5.25. Prison rule 27-A reads, "Possession, distribution, manufacture or introduction into the institution of any drug, drug paraphernalia, alcoholic beverage or intoxicant not prescribed for the individual by the

medical staff and verified by the individual's medical record, including components for manufacture such as sugar, yeast, etc.” This reports all such disciplinary write-ups from June 1, 2010 to May 31, 2015. It would be redacted of confidential investigative information. I must point out that this log does not report the type of drug or the introduction process by which the drug was conveyed into the prison (i.e. the mailroom). There are a total of 864 incidents listed in this report.

As of today we have discovered 13 responsive electronic and hard copy documents with a total of approximately 50 pages. The Department of Corrections charges \$1.00 per electronic document or 0.50 per photocopied page but we can scan the hard copy documents. Please submit payment in the amount of \$13.00 made payable to State of New Hampshire and the documents will be released to you.

We will continue to search for responsive documents that were referenced in this letter and will provide you with additional cost estimates and a release schedule as we find them.

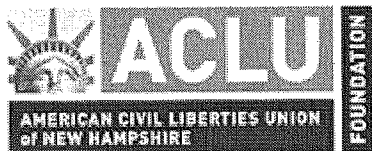

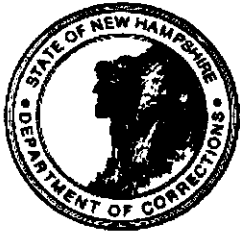

B. Mail Security Screening

3. Incoming correspondence shall be written only in ink or pencil and shall not exhibit any drawings, stickers, or other depictions.

The meeting was called to order at 9:15 a.m. by Commissioner Wrenn.

Longevity Presentations:

Commissioner Wrenn presented a 25-year certificate and pin to John Limoge, a 20-year certificate and pin to Jon Hanson, and a 15-year certificate and pin to Jeff Lyons. Jeff Lyons and Nancy Wolcott took photos.

Commissioner Wrenn

1. **Minutes of the 12/18/14 meeting were approved.**
2. **New Unclassified Appointments:** Exec Staff members are invited to attend a swearing-in ceremony on March 19th at 9 a.m. in Fox Chapel for:
 - Michelle Goings as Warden of NCF
 - Paula Mattis as Director of Medical/Forensics
 - Doreen Wittenberg as Director of Administration
3. **Joint Citizens' Advisory Board Meeting:** This annual event will take place this year on April 10th, from 9 a.m. to noon, in Fox Chapel. A working agenda was attached to the Exec Staff agenda.

Bob Mullen, Administration

1. **Operational Budget:** Director Mullen made handouts available of the February 2015 Budget Summary and the 2016-2017 Proposed Budget. He indicated he would have divisional summaries available for directors after the meeting. Director Mullen noted the challenges of this year's budget, e.g., OT will be close to \$9 million this year which means that other things such as state travel will have to be denied. He noted he has committed to several thousand dollars in SCAPP (State Criminal Alien Assistance Program) funds for the first time ever to invest in OT, in addition to taking funds from medical.

The 2016-2017 Operational Budget started last July. The first page in the handouts shows the class line, indicating last year's actual budget was \$99 million; we asked for \$123 million in 2016 and \$127 million in 2017, but received from the Governor \$111 million for 2016 and \$117 million for 2017. We asked for 81 new positions for new women's prison and reduced that to 78 new positions. Because state revenues are off by \$200 million, we know there will be further major cuts. Three quarters of our budget is staff salaries. The Commissioner emphasized that the budget formation is a process and we have to suggest things to cut that are unlikely to be cut.

2. **Capital Budget:** Director Mullen explained that we have put in for 5 items in the 2016-2017 Capital Budget and all have been approved by the Governor. We asked for \$44 million two years ago for the new women's prison but were given \$38 million. It is probably going to be over \$50 million. The Governor has upped it. Other Capital Budget areas: Roof replacements in Concord; NCF access road; repairs to bathroom floor in H-Bldg.; Staff scheduling system.

Commissioner Wrenn:**4. Labor Management Update:** [REDACTED]

- 5. Greeting Cards:** The Commissioner announced that there will be an amendment to the Inmate Mail policy that will prohibit the use of cards (or anything with a thick stock) coming into the prison because it is a major transmission source of Suboxone. We also will no longer allow drawings or anything with crayon or markers because this can also be source of Suboxone. The donation of greeting cards to the chapel is an area that still needs to be looked into. Major Fouts said they don't see this as a problem, unlike cards coming in from family and friends. The Commissioner has notified the Inmate Communication Committee. This should be effective in early April.
- 6. Literary Review Committee:** The Commissioner attended one of their meetings the other day and realizes that they have a lot of issues challenging them with publications coming in. The policy is extremely narrow in what is or isn't acceptable. E.g., are stories newsworthy or salacious? Also articles having to do with drugs cannot promote drugs in any way. The Commissioner is considering creating a separate (from the mail policy) LRC policy. Even some catalogs are questioned. There is also the issue of electronic publications and email in the future. There was discussion about whether or not the LRC is just for the Concord Prison or for all prisons and how do we get organized with one central LRC committee.

Assistant Commissioner Helen Hanks:

- 1. New Women's Prison Update:** A/C Hanks explained that we have rejected the guaranteed maximum price due to it being significantly out of budget. Current consideration is being given to going to a more traditional design, bringing the housing units except for C2 into one building to determine if it narrows the margin between budgeted and current project costs.
- 2. Electronic Victim Notification System:** A presentation on a sustainable long-term system was watched by Ron Cormier, Linda Socha, Jessica Parent, the Commissioner and A/C, and we're moving forward on it. Relates to a DOS grant. Using a J-One infrastructure.
- 3. ET Policy and Security Threat Groups policies:** [REDACTED]
- 4. Competency Office Status:** Office of Forensic Examiners; Pre-adjudication process. Dr. Comiskey is no longer with us. We've brought on 5 forensic psychologists. Cleaning up a backlog in that area.
- 5. Data:** A/C Hanks noted that we are resurrecting performance measures on the ASCA model. Ron Cormier and Joan Schwartz will be meeting with people to determine ways we can measure what we're doing and can do business better.
- 6. MOU for GIS software through DOS:** Ron Cormier and others will work on deploying this, allowing Field Service teams to use CORIS data to track the geographical location of probationers and parolees; long term goal is to include in the GIS system data sets such as location of LADC services and other mental health services to determine proximity to the client needs.
- 7. Working to revamp our website:** Ron Cormier, Linda Socha, and Nancy Wolcott working on this, with limitations until next budget season.
- 8. Naltrexone Pilot:** Working on this – Medicaid approved medication to help people addicted to opiates (heroin); lasts about a month and comes in pills and injectables, to make people feel sick if they use. Inmates will need to agree to this. Better than Methadone and Suboxone.
- 9. Drug Krokodil:** Some female inmates are using this new drug which is a substitute for heroin. Very serious and dangerous. From Russia. We're working on education models with our LADCs to try to deter use.

Jeff Lyons, PIO

- 1. Document Retention and Destruction Policy:** Jason Cooper, Joyce Leeka, and Jeff Lyons will be contacting each division director and warden from facility to facility, to determine which documents are needed and which can be destroyed.
- 2. Legislation Update:** Jeff Lyons made a hand-out available. First committee bills have to be out by this week; crossover day is April 2nd, when a bill goes from one chamber to the next chamber. HB245, to study state and county jails, and HB682, Group II, were killed. HB674, re unclassified positions including warden of women's prison, passed House, was killed in Fin. Comm., but will come back in HB2. SB28 for transitional housing maintenance fund to fix up transitional houses was killed in Senate but should be resurrected so that first \$9 will continue to go to GF but anything beyond that could be used for the maintenance fund. Tomorrow Senators Forrester and D'Allesandro will be touring all three halfway houses. SB139 related to license plates

(DOS inventory fund) to tie to consumer price index, but has been ITL'd but may go to a study. SB727 related to Industries becoming a program has been Retained in Committee (to take a closer look at it). SB140, related to penalties for inmates or their friends and family for harassing victims or others through electronic media, has been referred to study. HB488 related to abuse in the workplace requested by unions has been retained by EDA. HB472 related to Parole Procedure passed the CJ committee; this eliminates newspaper advertising of parole hearings and expands the PB to 9 members. SB43 changes the name of the women's prison to the NH Correctional Facility for Women. SB44 relates to the Right To Know bill – what counties have has been amended to now include NHDOC as well. SB53 dissolves the IACC of Women Offenders, amended into the ICJJC. SB138 relates to claims from clinical services to DOC and allows indemnification to MHM and vendors. HB333 requires annual reviews on dedicated funds. SB86 related to RFP bidders awards.

Chris Kench, Security and Training:

1. **Academy Update:** We will be graduating 25 COTs on April 3rd.
2. **In-Service Update:** Director Kench noted that this is plugging along but we are getting a lot of “no-shows”; suggest as a supervisor you keep a tab on this.
3. **Online Update:** There are still about 100 people who have to complete their January training. There was discussion about speakers. Not all computers have speakers. Earbuds can be purchased for 85 cents each but this is also a security issue (suggestion to use only one earbud). Buying your own speakers is not advised by IT. You can also read the narrative on the online version. It was agreed that the January PREA online training will be left up longer.
4. **Vehicle Registrations:** Vehicle Registrations are done for the most part.

Lisa Currier, Human Resources:

1. **Staffing Update:** Lisa Currier said we are tracking 116 positions; 72 are officers and 44 are non-uniform. 14 are PT or COTs. We have 31 active positions we are recruiting for. 66 positions are in some state of activity. Recruitment is moving; we're filling our vacancies. Lisa Currier handed out recruitment reports to each area director.
2. **Charitable Campaign:** Lisa Currier noted that this is to start on April 24th and goes to May 22, 2015.
3. **Part-time employment:** When hiring part-timers, be sure they do not work more than 29 hours a week.

Ron Cormier, Business Information/IT

1. **CORIS Upgrade and Testing:** Abilis is working on CORIS upgrades. Once they're done they will pass it onto us for user testing. Ron Cormier made a handout available on UAT Testing; this will be a 4-6 week period, April to May.
2. **Infrastructure Upgrade:** Linda Socha noted that we have four new CORIS servers. Berlin got additional equipment.
3. **Secure printing and scanning instructions:** These will be made available for multi-service machines.
4. **Documents Management Software purchased:** Working to scan in documents and storing on the system. We are trying to eliminate filing cabinets; original documents don't have to be retained if they are scanned.

1. **Dept. of Education did an audit of special ed.,** as noted by Helen Hanks.

Commissioner Wrenn:

Use of Drones: The Commissioner brought up as an FYI that drones are now attempting to be used to deliver drugs, guns, cell phones into prison grounds at some prisons.

New Restrictions on Incoming Inmate Mail Implemented

(Concord, NH) New Hampshire Department of Corrections Commissioner William L. Wrenn announced that, due to increasing drug contraband coming into the prisons through the mail, new mail restrictions will go into effect on May 1, 2015.

As of May 1st, all incoming mail for inmates must be on standard stock stationery or standard stock plain post cards. Correspondence must be written or typewritten in ink or pencil. No greeting cards, unusually thick stationery, or postcards featuring any type of printed design or picture shall be used. Mail shall not exhibit drawing, stickers or other depictions. Any mail that violates this change will be returned to sender.

Commissioner Wrenn called this "an unfortunate but necessary change" due to the rise in drug-related contraband (in particular, Suboxone strips) entering the prison that can be hidden in these cards and drawings. Suboxone is a medication for people who are addicted to opiates; it is illegal unless prescribed.

Commissioner Wrenn said, "Our mailroom has experienced an increase in cards, postcards, and other postal material containing Suboxone, in the hopes that a few will get past security. Often the return addresses on the cards or letters are false."

In some instances mail has been sent to unknowing inmates with arrangements made by other inmates to retrieve the mail or possibly threaten or harm the recipients if they do not cooperate.

The technology needed in the mailroom for detecting drugs is cost-prohibitive, as people employ more innovative ways to seal the drugs into the cards, post cards, and crayon-layered drawings. The best way to discover this contraband is by manually scanning the hundreds of letters, books,

magazines, periodicals, and cards that are received daily. This would require the use of additional staff that is not available in the Department.

Inmates can still receive photographs and letters that include birthday or holiday greetings.

Commissioner Wrenn said, "We did not make this decision lightly but, until affordable alternatives are evident to us, we must stand by it."

The following items and/or incoming and outgoing general correspondence containing any of the following may be rejected (not an inclusive list):

1. Includes any information about the planning, promoting or furtherance of criminal activity.
2. Violates a prohibited act, rule, regulation or directive governing the DOC or facility where the offender is housed.
3. Contains instructions for the manufacture or construction of a weapon, ammunition, explosive, narcotic, narcotic paraphernalia, alcoholic beverage or unlawful substance.
 - a. Illegal contraband (i.e. weapons, explosives, drugs) will be turned over to law enforcement authorities.
- Materials associated with Fantasy Sports Leagues or other types of gambling activity. This includes, but is not limited to baseball, basketball, football, racing and other sporting teams or events.
5. Advocates violence.
6. Any materials which illustrate, explain, describe or teach the ability to frustrate a crowd or riot control methods.
7. Any materials which teach or give the ability to sabotage or disrupt communications networks, including internal and external communications and automated information systems.
8. Any materials which illustrate, explain, describe or teach the ability to manipulate in any form or fashion a locking device, mechanical restraint or any safety equipment used by staff in the course of their duties.
9. Any materials which depict gang activity, or may be construed as pertaining to gang activity.
10. Postage stamps, plain or stamped envelopes, stickers, maps, calendars of any type, Polaroid photos, unused cards or postcards, more than five (5) small newspaper clippings, more than ten (10) sheets of paper, homemade craft items or altered magazines (including any picture, articles, or any item that has been taken out of a magazine), construction paper and pages from coloring books. The following cards will be rejected:
 - a. Homemade envelopes are not permitted in incoming or outgoing mail.
 - b. Homemade cards are not permitted in incoming mail.
 - c. Musical cards or cards that contain a mechanical mechanism are not permitted.
 - d. Cards larger than 8 ½" x 11" will not be accepted.
 - e. Cards containing glitter.
11. Magazines containing complementary items that meet the definition of contraband (CDs, fragrance samples, scratch tickets, etc.) may have the item(s) of contraband removed by mailroom staff to facilitate delivery of the magazine to the offender. Removal of items of contraband by staff does not constitute censorship.
12. Any material that depicts pornography, sexually-explicit conduct and/or nudity. See DOC policy 1.3.C.8 *Pornography* for definitions.
13. Materials encouraging sexual behavior that is criminal in nature or is determined by Sex Offender Management staff to be detrimental to an offender's rehabilitation.
 - a. Possession of certain materials by a sex offender may be a violation of the offender's STOP contract (See DOC Policy 1.2.C.9 *Sex Offender Restrictions*).
14. Pictures of current or ex-staff members, contract staff members, volunteers or interns of the DOC.
15. Violates postal regulations e.g., threats, blackmail, extortion. Such correspondence shall be reported by mailroom staff to the proper postal authorities and Special Investigations Unit.
16. Contains encoded material or material written in code. This does not automatically prohibit publications and/or letters written in a recognized foreign language.
 - a. Correspondence written in a foreign language may be delayed up to an additional twenty

(20) working days to facilitate translation and review of the contents.

b. If after twenty (20) days staff attempts to translate the materials are unsuccessful, the correspondence may be rejected.

17. Depicts, encourages, or describes methods of escape from secure custody or restraint, or contains blueprints, drawings or similar descriptions of correctional facilities.

18. Advocates racial, religious, or national hatred in such a way as to create a danger of violence in the facility.

Hi Jeff,

Our rule, adopted for the same reasons you are addressing, is as follows:

Inmates may begin receiving mail as soon as they arrive at prison. Multilayered cards, crayon and marker drawings are not allowed. Inmates are allowed to have 25 photos in their possession; the photos can not be larger than 8x10, may not be Polaroids and must not be pornographic in nature. Inmates may not have photos of or including themselves. Inmates may not receive packages except when authorized for medical reasons.

OVERVIEW OF INMATE MAIL REGULATIONS AFFECTING FAMILY AND FRIENDS

The Wyoming Department of Corrections (WDOC) recognizes the importance of family and friends. We therefore encourage and appreciate regular correspondence with your incarcerated loved ones in accordance with the following general guidelines.

1. For security reasons, incoming mail must include the full name and full return address of the sender on the outside front of the envelope. Incoming mail must also include the confinement name, confinement number and full mailing address of the inmate on the outside front of the envelope. Mail for which the recipient and/or sender cannot be positively identified will be returned to the U.S. Postal Service without mail processing.
2. All incoming mail will be opened for examination, scan search, reading, photocopying, and/or inspection by person or inspection device in accordance with inmate mail policy and procedure.
3. Incoming mail must be sent through the U. S. Postal Service only. Mail received through alternative mail service providers such as UPS or FedEx will not be accepted.
4. Incoming mail shall not have anything other than the canceled postage stamp or postage label, address label, and return address label or stamp glued, taped or otherwise affixed to the envelope or package, or its contents. (Security requirements dictate that the envelope and its contents be easily inspected for contraband, so the use of preprinted self-adhesive or gummed address labels is discouraged.) Stickers, sealing wax, glitter, lip stick/gloss, or other items may not be attached to the outside of the envelope or to any of the enclosures.
5. Outside friends and family are not permitted to order items for delivery to an inmate. Individuals may not send packages or publications to inmates (no exceptions). Publications must be received directly from the publisher or bookseller. Hard back books and other hard back publications are prohibited.
6. Generally, inmates may not correspond with other incarcerated individuals.
7. Mail to or from the victim(s) of the inmate's crime(s) of conviction (both past and present) will not be accepted, except when formally participating in the Offender Apology Letter Bank operated by the Wyoming Board of Parole or as authorized in writing by the CEO or designee.
8. Mail may be in a foreign language, but shall not be in coded language or symbols.
9. Mail that is received from the sender with postage due shall be rejected and returned to sender.
10. A person may notify WDOC on his/her own behalf, or on the behalf of his/her own minor children, that mail from a particular inmate is unwanted.

The following items may be included in the envelope with an incoming letter as long as the total thickness of the letter does not exceed ¼ inch and the overall dimensions of the envelope do not exceed 9” by 12”. Enclosures other than those listed below may result in the letter and all contents being rejected and returned to you at yours or the inmate’s expense.
- hand-written, typed or printed written correspondence;
 - no more than ten (10) newspaper and magazine clippings;
 - small pamphlets;
 - photocopies or carbon copies;
 - individual business cards;
 - hand-made drawings;
 - cashier’s check or money order (These items may only be received for deposit to the inmate’s account if they are sent directly from a spouse, parent, grandparent, children, grandchildren, sibling, another person on the inmate’s approved visitors list, or a person on the inmate’s telephone list with prior approval from facility CEO. Personal checks and cash will be rejected.);
 - single-page paper calendars without foreign substances or stickers on them;
 - no more than ten (10) personal photographs no larger than 8” by 10”, which are not sexually explicit, do not depict nudity and are otherwise in compliance with the inmate mail policy.
12. Mail which violates the provisions of the inmate mail policy, which contains inflammatory material, or which may otherwise present a threat to the safety, security or good order of the institution, public, staff or inmates will be rejected, including but not limited to mail containing:
- Any item that is considered to be illegal or evidence of illegal activities;
 - Threats, plans or evidence of criminal activity or the introduction or transfer of contraband;
 - Plans for activities in violation of the inmate mail policy or Code of Inmate Discipline;
 - Solicitation of gifts, goods or money other than to or from the inmate’s immediate family;
 - Sexually explicit material including pictorial depictions or portrayals of actual or simulated sexual acts;
 - Gang-related material or information;
 - Cash or other forms of remittance from individuals who are not immediate family members or individuals who are not on the inmate’s visitors list;
 - Material not intended for the addressee; but rather material intended for other parties;
 - Unauthorized enclosures or glue, glitter, powder, stickers, wax, stamps, excessive perfume or cologne, lipstick/gloss, possible bodily fluids, crayon or any other foreign substance attached to or absorbed into the envelope or contents.

Thank you for following these few guidelines. By doing so, we can insure your mail is quickly processed and received.

Halawa's no-contact facility helps to reduce prison contraband

Two weeks ago, Halawa Correctional Facility rolled out a new, no-contact visitors center. The goal was to keep contraband from getting into prisoners' hands.

Dept. of Public Safety director Ted Sakai says the new facility seems to be working for the moment. "It's still a trial period, but I want to see it run for a few months and see how it goes," he said.

KHON2 wanted to know if that means illegal drugs and other contraband are no longer getting into the prison.

"Not through visits. We're finding contraband trying to come in through other means, but not through visits," said Sakai.

So far, officials say the facility is doing its job in regards to stopping visitor-to-inmate exchanges. But that's not the only way illegal items can get in.

"Right now we've been getting a hit recently on people sending contraband through the mail," said Sakai.

According to the department, all mail is checked before it enters the facility and prison officials say this keeps drugs from getting into inmates' hands.

"All inmate mail that is brought in is opened searched and read. The only exception to that rule is our legal mail," said Toni Schwartz, DPS public information officer.

Mail is considered legal if it's from government officials, attorney of record and the courts. While staff cannot open these, prisoners are supervised by multiple staff members when they do open them.

"Identified confidential mail is presented to the inmate and the inmate will open it in front of staff and the staff will check it for contraband without reading the mail," said Schwartz.

If illegal contraband is found in the packages, the prison notifies the proper authorities.

"We need to secure the facility as priority number one," said Sakai.

They came back in September and asked about it again.. and did a positive story about our efforts working.

New Restrictions on Incoming Inmate Mail Implemented

(Concord, NH) New Hampshire Department of Corrections Commissioner William L. Wrenn announced that, due to increasing drug contraband coming into the prisons through the mail, new mail restrictions will go into effect on May 1, 2015.

As of May 1st, all incoming mail for inmates must be on standard stock stationery or standard stock plain post cards. Correspondence must be written or typewritten in ink or pencil. No greeting cards, unusually thick stationery, or postcards featuring any type of printed design or picture shall be used. Mail shall not exhibit drawing, stickers or other depictions. Any mail that violates this change will be returned to sender.

I have received a number of inquiries about the attached Amendment to PPD 5.26 (Inmate Mail Service). The purpose of this email is to clarify the language under Section IV.B.3:

3. Incoming correspondence shall be written only in ink or pencil and shall not exhibit any drawings, stickers, or other depictions.

It is important that you keep in mind that the intent of this amendment is NOT to limit a person's ability to write a letter to an inmate, but to prevent drugs from being hidden within heavy paper stock or mixed with a fluid and dried on the paper (sometimes camouflaged by drawings).

The term "ink" used in Section IV.B.3 (above) refers to the medium used on correspondence that is typed on a typewriter or computer, printed from a printer, or handwritten with a pen. The other acceptable medium for handwritten correspondence is pencil. An unacceptable medium in the writing of a letter would be crayon.

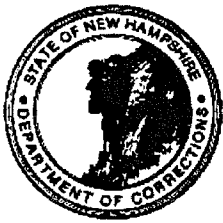
Items such as photocopies, newspaper articles, or family pictures (printed on standard white photocopy paper or photo quality paper) are not impacted by this amendment, as long as they meet the specified standards of this policy (e.g., no nudity, etc.).



B. Mail Security Screening

2. All incoming correspondence shall utilize standard stock stationary or standard stock plain postcards. No greeting cards, postcards from particular locations or featuring any type of printed design, picture, or depiction or unusually thick stationary shall be utilized for the correspondence.
3. Incoming correspondence shall be written only in ink or pencil and shall not exhibit any drawings, stickers, or other depictions.
